



Getting Acquainted with First Lady Wendy

When it came time for college Wendy started at ITT in Dayton the very next day after her high school graduation, studying electrical engineering technology. She worked briefly in Indiana and then went to work for the Federal Aviation Administration in Mansfield where she met Pastor Erv at a church fellowship group in 1987 and where they just enjoyed a fun-fellowship time. It was a transitional time for Wendy, moving from Dayton to Mansfield, and it took a while for the two of them to admit they liked each other. In fact, Wendy turned down Erv's first request for a date! She's not sure when the relationship charged, but obviously it did since they married on August 25th, 1990. Even at that time Wendy knew that her life would involve being a pastor's wife, which she wholeheartedly embraced since church was a very important part of her life.

to Caldwell north of Marietta, where they served for five years, after which they were appointed to Orangeville-Vernon in northeast Ohio for seven years. An interesting sidelight to this experience is that this dual charge was divided between Pennsylvania and Ohio, making communications, taxes, etc., more complex at times! Following that appointment they spent ten years in McDonaldsville in North Canton - - and then to Middlefield.

Caleb attended kindergarten through grade six in the Badger Local Schools, completing grades 7 -- 12 in the Jackson Local Schools, graduating in 2012.

Other interesting events in Wendy's life included playing softball in high school, and because Caleb played baseball, the little family enjoyed sports and spent a great deal of family time playing catch and related activities. She's an avid Ohio sports fan and related attending an Ohio State football game a couple of years ago -- an "electric" experience if you've never been to Ohio Stadium!

Both Wendy's father and her brother were in the military, and her brother's positions have enabled her to visit the White House as well as the Pentagon. She's very proud of her brother, one of whose positions was serving as the driver for the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Wendy enjoys church involvement and is currently participating in the "Disciple" class plus other small groups, which has enabled her to meet more people within the church family. This warm, friendly lady is pleased to immerse herself in church activities and is "just thankful for being a Christian" since she accepted Jesus at age 8. And WE'RE just thankful that our congregation is blessed by her presence! We hope our relationship will be a very lengthy one!

Once I graduated from high school and went to Youngstown State, my family stopped going to church. I didn't go back to church until my senior year at YSU, and then I went to Richard Brown UMC, because it was within walking distance from my apartment. The greeters that first Sunday at Richard Brown UMC were Mary Lou and Jack. They realized I was new right off, and stuck with me the entire day! Another influence on me has been Dale Briggs, the current pastor at NBCC. He is a great man of God, and has shown my family and me great love and compassion, especially in this year since Dad's passing.

I have witnessed God working in and through Middlefield UMC when people have really stepped up for me in the time since my dad died. That event rocked my world and my family to the core! People listened and didn't judge me for what I was saying, venting about, or anything. My faith has been tested since my dad's passing, and I can't imagine my life without those folk—they were the hands, eyes, ears, and feet of Christ for me.

I would like to see that same caring attitude spread to everyone in this church: for us to be kind to each other, to be supportive, to step into service in the programs at our church. If we can do that, it will show the community that we have endured and are back stronger than ever.
